





# Dear Siblings in Christ,

As we begin the new liturgical year and the season of Advent, I wish to share with you a piece of wisdom gained during a webinar with our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry and the Archbishop of Jerusalem and the Middle East, Hosam Naoum, on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving.

Archbishop Naoum responded to a question regarding the celebration of Christmas this year in his province, and especially in the Diocese of Jerusalem. Amid this war and the massive loss of lives, destruction of homes and vital infrastructure, and holding of hostages and prisoners, he suggested that the whole church intensely focus on the Advent themes of Home, Love, Joy, and Peace. (And I fervently pray that the current cease-fire in place as I write this will continue.) Archbishop Naoum added that we ought to strive to put a smile on a child's face as a counterbalance to the despair and anguish of the thousands of children caught in the middle of this war. I thought this especially appropriate in this season leading up to the celebration of the birth of the Christ Child, our Savior.

In the context of our diocese and the communities we serve, a refocusing of our attention and activity might be a helpful and holy endeavor. I suggest that a focus on Hope, a focus on Love, Joy, and Peace, a turning down the volume and intensity of our often chaotic and frantic preparation for Christmas, become part of our Advent discipline.

In reality, there is little we can do as individuals to affect peace in the Holy Land. But we can create peace in our communities, our places of work, our schools, our churches, our homes, and our hearts. The prayers and liturgies of Advent in our tradition all point us toward interior preparation and peace-making. It is a time of anticipation for the coming of the Christ Child anew in each of us and the situations of our lives. Use this time, not in frantic activity, but as God's creation around us suggests: to slow down, calm down, pray down deep in our being as Mary did, "let it be done unto me according to your word."

Use the traditions of Advent to pace the anticipation rather than accelerate the celebration. Advent, as its own season, beckons us to an alternative to the chaos, and provides a period of waiting and watchfulness that is holy, wise, and helpful to God's people. Seek to make peace with those around you, live in joy, and share God's love with everyone in the hope of the coming of the Kingdom of God.

Bring a smile to a child's face by creating calm and warmth in their lives. Spend time teaching a child the stories that bring us to this holy season and shield them from the harshness so often associated with the frantic nature of getting to Christmas Day.

The awaited Feast of the Incarnation reminds us in this season, that the birth of Jesus happened amid a world in turmoil, political struggles, wars, and the slaughter of the innocent children for the sake of power and control. In this Advent season, let it be our purpose to stand against such inclinations and focus our prayers, our activities and our very lives on the Hope, Joy, Love, and Peace that comes to us in Jesus Christ.

Have a blessed and holy season of Advent as we await the Celebrations of Christmas.







# Notes on this Sunday's Readings – December 3rd (1st Sunday of Advent, Year B)



Isaiah 64:1-9 Psalm 80:1-7 1 Corinthians 1:3-9 Mark 13:24-37

The season of Advent begins today. The name of the season means "coming," and it celebrates God's coming to us in the birth of Jesus and looks toward Christ's return at the end of history as Savior and Judge.

The first reading from Isaiah reflects the intensity of the prophet's hope for the Messiah. In a period of Israel's history when confidence in the people's own efforts to build God's Kingdom had collapsed, Isaiah expresses that hope

in a passage that has been a part of the Advent liturgy since the earliest days of the Church: "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down..."

In the second reading we hear Paul's greeting in his first letter to Corinth. Recognizing the many spiritual gifts of the Corinthian church (a source of their strength, but also a source of the controversy which caused him to write) he says that those spiritual gifts are given to prepare us to greet the return of Christ. Jesus' message to his followers is an assurance that he will return and that our lives should be lived in preparation for that return.

This theme of watching for his return is always central on the first Sunday of Advent. To-day's reading from Mark is the parable of the door-keeper. It reminds us that we are always to be on the watch for Jesus' return. The liturgy is the way the Church lives in the time between Jesus' first coming and his second coming. In word and sacrament he comes to us again and again, veiled, but present to eyes of faith. In the Eucharist and in ministry to others we are continually being prepared to greet him when he comes again in glory.

Our gatherings for worship are meant to be points of departure for us to move into the world in active works of ministry to the hungry, the helpless, the imprisoned, the lonely, the sick, and the dying. The reign of Christ must begin with members of his body the Church making him known in the world, especially to the least of his sisters and brothers

## Readings for Sunday, December 3, 2023 The First Sunday of Advent, Year B

#### **The Collect**

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

#### Old Testament—Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence--as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil--to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence! When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O Lord, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people.

#### Psalm 80:1-7 Qui regis Israel

1 Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, leading Joseph like a flock; \* shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.

2 In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, \* stir up your strength and come to help us.

3 Restore us, O God of hosts; \*

show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

4 O Lord God of hosts, \*

how long will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?

5 You have fed them with the bread of tears; \* you have given them bowls of tears to drink.

6 You have made us the derision of our neighbors, \*

and our enemies laugh us to scorn.

7 Restore us, O God of hosts; \*

show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

#### The Epistle—1 Corinthians 1:3-9

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind-- just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you-- so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### The Gospel—Mark 13:24-37

Jesus said, "In those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in clouds' with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. "From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. "But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

Pray along with the Collect for Advent I, found on page 211 of The Book of Common Prayer. Set a timer for three minutes to sit in silence and hear what God might be saying back to you.

# Thursday, December 7 **BLESS**

Call or write a letter to a family member with whom you would like to have a closer relationship. Make plans in the new year to chat on the phone or meet over Zoom or in person. Let them know how much you love them and look forward to knowing them better.

# Friday, December 8

Read or watch your local news. Ask God to open your heart and eyes to ways you can promote reconciliation and healing in your community.

# Saturday, December 9 REST

Spend at least 45 minutes outside today, without doing yard work or fixing lights or redoing bows on the garland. Take some time to just sit outside and let the air wash over you, taking away the stress and worry of the moment. Read Psalm 100 before and after your outside time. See how this psalm may


