

Dear Readers,



This is so that Stephen, wearing his special shoes, can slide easily between the foot pedals to play the right base notes.

November 24, 2024 – Christ the King (B) Christ the King Sunday

Today, many parishes within The Episcopal Church celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. This feast day falls on the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the Sunday before the beginning of Advent. The feast is a relative newcomer to the liturgical calendar; it was first instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925, when he wrote the encyclical *Quas Primas*. Here, he lays out the different understandings of kingship that Jesus Christ possesses.

Pius XI also explains how Christians ought to live as a result of Christ's kingship:
"He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the doctrines of Christ. He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God. He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone. He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, as instruments of justice unto God." By the 1970s, the Feast of Christ the King had been more or less institutionalized throughout many Christian denominations and was fixed as occurring the last Sunday before Advent.

The lessons for this day support the understanding of Christ as sovereign. Jeremiah writes, "The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land." The Song of Zechariah bridges the seasons beautifully as we hear the prophecy foretelling the ministry of St. John the Baptist, from whom we'll hear more very shortly. The Letter to the Colossians explains, "[The Father] has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins." It is only in the Gospel reading that we see the most difficult aspect of Jesus' kingship: "The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!' There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.'" We remember that Jesus' kingship is not distant and remote in some capital city thousands of miles away. His kingship is not detached nor aloof. No, he reigns for now in the very hearts of the faithful, freeing us and bringing us together under his most gracious rule.

Collect for the Feast of Christ the King

Almighty and everlasting God, whose will it is to restore all things in your well-beloved Son, the King of kings and Lord of lords: Mercifully grant that the peoples of the earth, divided and enslaved by sin, may be freed and brought together under his most gracious rule; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen (BCP 236).

Saint Mark's Episcopal Church Vestry Meeting Minutes October 15, 2024, 6:30 p.m. via Zoom

<u>Members Present</u>: Fr. Chris Jubinski, Diane Stewart, Tom Horan, Steve DeCaro, Diane Feil, Tom Hadlock, Marj Kulesa, Barbara Pettus, Steve Turner, Sandy Wyman, Tom Simson, Carol Fitton

Fr. Chris called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. He offered a prayer for the Poor and Neglected from the Book of Common Prayer.

Consent Agenda: A motion was made by Barbara, seconded by Tom Horan, to approve the Consent Agenda, which includes the minutes from the September 17, 2024 Vestry meeting.

<u>Finance Report</u>: Tom mentioned that this month's reports are very basic due to the recent software conversion from Church Windows to Aplos, but he hopes to have YTD comparison reporting next month.

Bright Beginnings: YTD September Tuition receipts, which comprise the bulk of Bright Beginning's Income, were \$600.7K, up 16.1% compared to \$517.4K YTD September 2023, while YTD September Income increased 33.6% to \$745.1K vs \$557.5K YTD September 2023. YTD September expenses were \$618.8K compared to \$619.3K YTD September 2023, a drop of 0.01%. Tom noted that salaries comprise most of the expenses and these were down 2.6% from \$530.4K in 2023 to \$516.4K in 2024. YTD September 2024 Net Income is \$126.2K vs -\$61.8K in 2023, a definitive turnaround. Tom noted that the \$65K loan from SMC has now been fully repaid.

SMC: Tom S reported YTD September 2024 Church Donations of \$129.6K vs \$179.9K a year ago, a drop of 27.9%. He mentioned that there was a major gift (approximately \$50K) in early 2023 that favorably impacted last year's Donations. Other Revenue increased to \$107.3K from \$16.9K in 2023, due mainly to rent from the Beinecke Building. For YTD September 2024, Salaries and Benefits Expenses were \$254.9K vs \$237.5K YTD September 2023, an increase of 7.3%.

Tom reminded us that while we have started receiving \$10K/month rental income for the Beinecke Building, the real estate commission (paid upfront) is being expensed over 12 months at \$8K/month, which means we will start receiving the income benefit of the full \$10K/month rent beginning next month. Until then, we will essentially have net rent from the Beinecke Building of \$2K/month.

<u>Investment Committee:</u> Barbara reported that since the balance is less than \$1mm (actual balance today is \$756,256), the funds have been moved into a money market fund (essentially a cash position), to avoid taking any negative market risk. The 7-day yield is currently 4.75% as a point of reference. The account remains at Fidelity, which continues to facilitate gifts of securities to SMC. With the move to a money market fund, Pam Sheiffer is stepping down as co-chair of the committee.

<u>Stewardship 2025</u>: Fr. Chris said the 2025 campaign theme is "Walk in Love". His letter introducing the campaign was emailed out today. Di and Tom Horan will be co-chairs of the campaign. Their letter will be going out at the end of the week. The campaign will run from October 20th through the Ingathering on November 24th, which auspiciously is also the date of the annual Parish Thanksgiving dinner. Diane asked the members of the Vestry to thoughtfully consider their pledges and to have them in by November 1, so an announcement can be made to the Parish that its Vestry has made their pledges.

<u>United Thank Offering (UTO)</u>: Marj reviewed plans for our parish involvement in this year's effort, which brings back an outreach that SMC was last involved with seven years ago. UTO is an international effort started in the late 1800s to raise funds to support innovative mission and ministry in The Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion that church budgets could not cover. Funds collected support grants by deserving entities. This year's theme is

"Gratitude", which can be acted on by specifically identifying the blessing(s) in your day and expressing gratitude by putting a donation in your UTO envelope (formerly little boxes). We are also encouraged to write down the blessing(s). The ingathering for each parish's UTO offering occurs at the Diocesan Convention, this year November 15th and 16th. We are getting a late start this year, so hope to start next year's effort in the spring.

Strategic Planning: Fr. Chris said he has now been here for 3.5 years! and much of that time has been spent working on facilities and infrastructure issues, which were necessary, but are hopefully now complete. This gives us an opportunity to begin to think about what we at SMC are called to do over the next year, 3 years, 5 years and longer, by developing a strategic plan. Fr. Chris asked Vestry members to think about the direction in which they want SMC to go and to think about possibilities for outreach, which will be discussed in detail in January.

Announcements / Upcoming Events:

Fr. Chris mentioned the following upcoming events:

- The Parish Hall will be using as an Early Voting location from October 26 through November 3
- SMC will be hosting a watch party for our neighboring Episcopal churches on November 2 to share in the Investiture of the new Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe. The program begins with the Introduction of the Diocese at 9:30, followed by the Installation service at 11 a.m.
- Fr. Chris will hold an evening service on November 4, the eve of Election Day.

Question and Answer Time:

- Is there a new date for the 100th Anniversary Celebration? Not yet as the Bishop's schedule is not yet available, but likely to take place in early 2025.
- Status of organ construction? Cabinetry is the biggest job and it is coming along well. There is a solid small group that is working well together.
- Status of carillon? Originally the factory was scheduled to complete the work on November 1, but it now looks like they will be shipping it around October 25, which gives it a good chance of being installed in time for Christmas.

Closing Prayer and Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:28 p.m. with the reciting of the Lord's Prayer.

<u>Next Vestry Meeting:</u> Vestry meetings are normally held on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 6:30 p.m. The upcoming meetings are scheduled for: November 19, December 17 at the Rectory, January 21, February 18, March 18, and April 15. The Annual Meeting is scheduled for May 4, 2025.

Walk in Love The Offertory



Our Stewardship Committee is encouraging online giving through a QR code that is on our website and in our Sunday bulletin. This is easier for the accounting warden to keep more accurate records as well as other practical reasons to collect pledges.

But still, the ushers go throughout the congregation passing the brass plates for parishioners' donations. Fewer and fewer people put their envelopes in the plates as they are moving towards donating online.

Something is lost here. An empty plate, subtly ignored by many is carried by members of the congregation awkwardly through the congregation. What was an actual way of placing one's gift – oneself – in a collective contribution no longer means the same thing. Our treasures being taken up to the altar and being acknowledged was a moment of God's blessing. The plates were closely followed by the most important gift of all, bread and wine becoming Christ's body and blood. This is a walk of love!

Maybe something is missing in our service. Giving online is a private action. It does not involve your very self in the worship. We used to fumble for our envelope or search for that dollar to put in your child's eager hand. The online transaction now is between you, your phone, and your bank and this has replaced a sense of collective and humanly-felt giving.

The human emotions that are engaged on Sunday morning as we rush at home to find the checkbook or nod our head sheepishly at the passing plate saying "not today" and all the other human manifestations of our incarnation are lost in the OR code.

Questions for Reflection:


What are options that we can share to take the next step in the ritual of the Offertory to bring our humanity to stewardship, a challenging and changing expression of our relationship to God?
